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The resolution of congress under which this register was compiled, requiring a statement of the amount of compensation allowed to the officers, agents, clerks, cadets and midshipmen, respectively, in the service of the United States, the states or countries in which they were born, and where employed, measures were adopted by the department of state at as early a period as was judged proper, to obtain the information called for, with regard to the officers and agents in any degree connected with that department, and who were employed within the limits of the United States,—the period prescribed for the completion of the work not admitting of a communication with those employed abroad; and the like steps were taken at the same time by the other departments, in respect to the officers, agents, &c. &c. under their superintendence. From a great deficiency of returns, however, many omissions and, perhaps, mistakes, as to the states or countries in which the persons holding commissions under the United States were born, have been unavoidable; and, from the same cause, still greater omissions will probably have occurred in relation to subordinate agents, not holding commissions, whose *names*, with the other particulars required, may have thus been altogether omitted. Oral information, too, obtained through personal enquiries, at the seat of government, has been relied upon in many instances, and this may not have been always correct. It is hoped, nevertheless, that the register, imperfect as it is from the above causes, will be found to answer, substantially, the end of the resolution of congress, under which it is compiled and published: but it is regretted that the appearance of it should have been thus long delayed, by the tardiness with which the returns, deficient as they are, were made.
